

HERKIMER COUNTY WORLD WAR I VETERANS BANNER PROJECT

World War One was known as the "Great War" or "The War To End All Wars." It lasted from July 28, 1914 to November 11, 1918. More than 70 million military personnel were mobilized in one of the largest wars in history. The United States remained neutral for the first 3 years of the war, even though a majority of Americans had sympathies for the Allies. Germany's use of submarines to sink Allied ships and the U.S. interception of the Zimmerman Telegram which promised German support of Mexico for an invasion of the United States led President Woodrow Wilson to ask Congress to declare war on Germany on April 6, 1917. Over 2,000 soldiers, including Army nurses, were involved in the war effort from Herkimer County. In commemoration of this centennial, we featured a new exhibit and oversaw a banner project featuring the photos of 75 Herkimer County soldiers and 2 nurses. We have also included several more soldiers who were submitted to us after the Banner project.

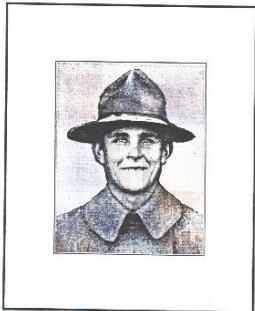


THE UNITED STATES WORLD WAR ONE CENTENNIAL COMMISSION

TOWN OF COLUMBIA



Cpl. Myron P. Burke
(1895-1970) Son of James and Jessie Burke from Cedarville. Served in the 126th Infantry. Fought overseas on Front at Chateau Thierry, Soissons, Argonne Forest, and made the march down the Rhine and served in Army of Occupation in Germany. He married Veta Prior and they had 2 children, Bradley and Joyce Riccardi.



Pvt. Joseph Hugick
(1896-1918) Son of Albert and Mary Huggick. He was in Co. M, 60th Infantry and was killed in action Oct. 25, 1918, buried in the Meuse-Argonne Cemetery in France. The Hugick Purcell Shepard American Legion Post still exists in Richfield Springs.

TOWN OF DANUBE



Pvt. George Rice
(1898-1966) Marine. Son of George & Ola Rice of Newville. He served in the 58th Company stationed at the US Marine Barracks at Norfolk Naval Base in Virginia. He served on the USS Sialia, a patrol vessel for the Navy. He married Ida Tinkler -they had 4 sons, 2 daus.



Sgt. Class W. Walter Rice
(1895-1986) Son of George & Ola Rice. Promoted from Pvt. 1st Class to Sgt. In Co. B, 163 Infantry. Transferred to Co. E, 161 Inf. Sent overseas, the 161st was not committed to combat, used as replacements for other units. Married Phoebe Cagwin and had one daughter Lois Mikalich.

DOLGEVILLE



Sgt. Otto Bahr (1896-1960) Born in Strassburg, Germany, he came to the U.S. with his parents to Dolgeville. He enlisted in the Army at Fort Slocum in 1914. He was part of the 8th Division in WW1. They sailed for France in Sept. 1918 and did not see action, assisted in processing men who had been in France to get home as soon as possible. He married Gladys Ganges and had stepson Cletus Lawrence.



Pvt. 1st Class Andrew Homrighaus
(1895-1962) Son of John and Mary Homrighaus, he was one of the first men to enlist from Dolgeville. Served in Co. C, 6th Reg., U.S. Eng. Wagoneer and participated in 7 battles overseas. He married Ruth Fish and ran the A&H Motor Sales in Dolgeville.



Pvt. 1st Class Merle Homrighaus
(1892-1982) Son of John and Mary Homrighaus, served overseas in an Engineering Squadron, Co. I, 22nd Engineers. His letters home to his fiancée Harriet Garlick are treasured by the family. Upon his return, he married Harriet and had 1 son and 2 daus. He was a painter and decorator, a family trade of his father.



Pvt. Grover Luther
(1889-1973) Son of Richard and Mattie Luther. He served in Battery D, 336th Field Artillery, attached to the 87th Division. They were on their way to the front when the Armistice was signed. Grover married Emma Braybrook. He was commander of the Herman Schumacher Post, doubling its membership & receiving a state citation.



Cpl. Herman Schumacher (1896-1918) Born in Germany, he came to the U.S. with his parents Andrew and Margaret in 1903. He enlisted July, 1917 and served in the 23rd Infantry. Twice wounded and gassed. Died Aug. 11, 1918 in France from wounds received in action. The American Legion was named in his memory and a park established in 1922.

TOWN OF FAIRFIELD



Cpl. Rudolph Hilts (1891-1971) Son of Charles and Susan Hilts, he was in Co. D, 301st Engineers, serving overseas in the St. Mihiel offensive and the Toul Sector. He married Iona Carey. He was a charter member of William Hempstead Post, VFW, Ilion, and Crim-Schaefer Post, Veterans of WW1, Herkimer.



Pvt. 1st Class Frank Lamphere (1889-1960) Son of Seymour and Mary Lamphere, he served in Co. H, 148th Infantry. Engagements overseas NW Verdun, Heurne, Argonne, Baccarat, Avocourt, Pannes. He was wounded in action on Nov. 3, 1918. He married Flossie Bell Allen-had 7 sons & 4 daus.



Pvt. Raymond Lynch (1896-1918) Son of Thomas and Frances Lynch, Co. E, 316 Infantry, participating in the great drive of the war, Meuse-Argonne Offensive. He was killed in action Sept. 29, 1918 and is buried in the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery in France.



FRANKFORT

Seaman Tony Daley (1900-1966) Son of Georgio and Rose Diego, he served on the USS Mount Vernon, which was torpedoed in a skirmish with a German U-Boat on Sept. 5, 1918. The crew were commended for their actions which saved the ship. He married Rose Falarde and had 3 children.



Pvt. James O. Davis (1895-1974) Enlisting in Newark, NY, he moved to Frankfort after his service. He was with the 1st Pursuit Group, Air Service, 10th regiment. Serving overseas, his unit supporting aerial reconnaissance and bombing of German forces.



Private 1st Class George Whitney (1894-1984) Son of Harvey & Katherine Whitney, he served in the 302nd Infantry and then the Military Police Corps stationed 6 months with Army of Occupation in Treves, Germany. He married Helen McDonald and had 3 children, George, Dorothy and Jean.

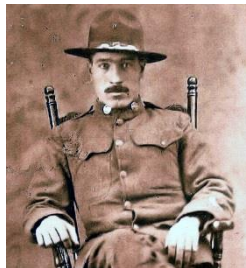
HERKIMER



Pvt. Harold Bellinger (1897-1918). Son of Frank and Minnie Bellinger, he enlisted in the US Marines and served in the 95th Co., 6th Reg., 1st Battalion. Engaged in the South of Soissons, Verdun, Bealleau Wood, Chatteau Thierry. He was killed July 19, 1918 in an attack near Percy Tigny and is buried in France.



Pvt. 1st Class Russell Bellinger (1895-1968) Son of Frank & Minnie Bellinger, he served in the Aviation Corps and was stationed in Dallas, TX at the Camp Dick Aviation Center. He married Frances Phillips and they had son Don, who inherited his love of flying.



Pvt. Guiseppe Cartagirone (1895-1968) Born in Italy, he was drafted while a resident in Frankfort and served in the 16th Co., 152nd Depot Brigade. He also served in Co. G, 17th Battalion, Camp Lee, Va. He moved to Herkimer and married Elvira and they had 6 children.



Pvt. Gigetto Cimino (1902-1994) Son of Frank and Josephine Cimino, he enlisted at Amsterdam because he was underage. He was in the 105th Infantry, 27th Division and was wounded at LaSalle River. He was the founder of the Anthony R. George Post, Herkimer, and received the Purple Heart. Married Mary Tocco and had 3 sons and 1 dau.



Pvt. Robert Compo (1890-1941) Born in Canada, he was the son of Levi and Elizabeth. He served in the 51st Pioneer Infantry and was overseas from July 25, 1918-July 6, 1919. Engaged in the battles of St. Mihiel, Woevre, Meuse, Moselle, and served in the Army of Occupation.



Pvt. 1st Class Morton Evans (1889-1918) Son of John and Lillian Evans, he was a member of Co. M, 107th Infantry. Prior to this, he served in Co. E, 69th Reg. on the Mexican border. While serving in France, he died of bronchial pneumonia in a French hospital on Nov. 9, 1918. His remains were returned home in 1921 and is buried in Oak Hill Cemetery, Herkimer.



1st Sgt. Carl Falk (1887-1956) Son of Charles & Mary Falk, he served in Co. A, 303rd Infantry and was overseas. One of the first 13 men inducted in Herkimer, known as the "Path-finders" also called the "Lucky 13," all returning home. Married Gertrude Metz and had 5 children.



Wagoner Charles Donovan (1893-1939) Son of James and Cynthia Donovan, he served in the 23rd Infantry in France and Germany with the Army of Occupation. He was in the battles of Aisne, Chateau Thierry, Aisne-Marne, St. Mihiel, Champagne, Meuse-Argonne and suffered from being gassed in the war.



Pvt. Thomas Franco (1896-1950) Born in Italy, he emigrated to the US in 1916. He was a machine gun operator in Co. A, 164th Infantry. For his service, he was granted U.S. citizenship. He married Virginia Pallidini and had 8 children.



1st Lt. QMC John D. Henderson (1887-1973) Son of John and Frances Henderson, he served with the A.S.S.O.S. Hdqts. 1st Army G.H.Q. He brought home relics from the battle-grounds, which are in the Society's collection. He was a charter member of the Herkimer American Legion. Married Marguerite Merrill and had one son.



Cpl. Carl Marriott (1897-1974) He joined the Mohawk Armory in 1916 to play basketball, little knowing he would be going to France soon after. He was in Co. M, 107th Inf. and was wounded in action Sept. 29, 1918. Purple Heart and Silver Star recipient. After the war, he played with "Basloe's Globetrotters." Married Irma Fuller – had 2 sons, 1 dau.



Army Nurse Anna C. Purcell (1886-1981) Daughter of James and Katherine Purcell, she was head nurse at Ellis Island before she enlisted to go overseas as an army nurse and served in a hospital in Portsmouth, England caring for the American soldiers during the war. This hospital specialized in the care of patients suffering from war neurosis (shell shock).



Pvt. 1st Class Samuel Pinkstone (1875-1948) Son of Samuel & Jane Pinkstone, he came to the US from England as a young boy. He was a member of Co. M, 107th Infantry and served overseas. He served in 3 wars – Spanish-American, Mexican Border and WW1, being the oldest member of Co. M.



Cpl. Edmund Rich (1892-1976) Born in Dolgeville, son of Frank & Louisa Rychkowski, he moved to Herkimer after the war. He served in Co. G, 303rd Infantry and then Co. H, 164 Infantry. He married Catherine Fox 1st and Marguerite Hall 2nd and had 1 daughter. He was a car dealer for many years.



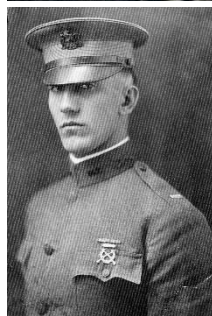
Pvt. Americo Risi (1897-1982) Born in Carpinetto, Italy, he emigrated in 1914 to the U.S. He was an employee of Munger's when he entered the War, serving in Co. A 12 Am. Tn. He married Margaret Baltice and they had 5 children, Victoria, Lawrence, Angela, Maryann, and Richard.



Cpl. Oscar E. Schultz (1895-1982) Son of Heman and Martha Schultz, he was a member of Co. M, 107th Infantry. Engagements overseas, East Poperinge Line, Dickebusch Sector, Belgium, Hindenburg Line, LaSalle River, Jonc De Mer Ridge, St. Maurice River. Married Margaret Higgins and had daughter Mary Macrina. He was a career Army Major.



Cpl. Howard Smith (1890-1960) Son of John and Cornelia Smith, he served in Co. B, 61st Regt. Engagement overseas, La Croix, Cuix Mines, Anould Rabadeau, St. Mihiel, Argonne and Meuse. He married 1st Lillian Griffin who died in childbirth. He married 2nd Emma Hall. He is buried in Oak Hill with his 2 wives and daughter.



1st Lieut. Carey Walrath (1895-1918) One of the presiding officers of Co. M, 107th Infantry, he and his brother were killed in the same battle in the attack on the Hindenburg Line on Sept. 28, 1918. The father was so distraught that he refused to bury his sons in the Oak Hill Cemetery, which was located on W.

German Street. The bodies of the boys were returned home and are buried in a family plot in Mohawk. Sons of Frank and Gertie Walrath.



Pvt. Carlton Walrath (1897-1918)

"Lieutenant Carey Walrath and his brother Private Carlton Walrath of Herkimer were both in the same shell hole near Bellecourt when a piece of shrapnel killed the Lieut.. As he fell his brother caught him and was about to lower him to the ground, when he also was killed by a machine gun bullet." - Herkimer Telegram-Record, 12/26/1918.



Pvt. Stanley Wezalis (1890-1963)

Born in Lithuania, he came to the U.S. in 1911, soon to serve his new country. He served in Co. D, 4th Battalion, Railway Transport Corps; 16th Co., 152nd Depot Brigade, receiving and organizing recruits, provide them with uniforms, equipment and military training.



TOWN OF HERKIMER

Wagoner Vensel Grubner

(1898-1987) Born in Austria-Hungary to Alois and Josephine Grubner, he came to the U.S. in 1902. He was one of the Co. M boys, 107th Infantry, serving as a Wagoner. He drove supply wagon mule teams on the Hindenburg Line. He married Helen Bellinger and they had 6 children.



Pvt. 1st Class Floyd Jackson (1895-1980) Son of William and Georgia Jackson, he fought in France with the 51st Pioneer Infantry and was exposed to gas while warning his unit. He received a Purple Heart posthumously in 2009. He married Marion Hopkinson and had 2 daughters.



Cpl. Raymond Lowell (1896-1985) Son of Charles and Lela Lowell, he served in the Field Artillery, 34th Reg., 12th Division. He married Stella Tarbox and they had 3 sons and 6 daughters. They lived in E. Herkimer on Zoller Ave.



Private Earl Peter Schell (1893-1959) Son of Peter and Minnie Nellis Shell of Smalls Bush. He was drafted and sent to Augusta, Ga. to Camp Hancock, one of the major training camps for WW1, where he remained until discharge. He was a machine gun instructor.

ILION



Pvt. 1st Class Glenn Ackler (1894-1955) Son of Edwin and Martha Ackler, he served in the 3rd Battalion, 153 Depot Brigade; Head Quarters 147th Infantry; Conservation & Reclamation Co. Quarter Master Corps.



Seaman Milton Deming (1892-1953) Son of Samuel and Charlotte Deming, he served in the Navy at the Naval Hospital at New London, Connecticut, the primary Eastern coast submarine base. He married Ethel Kibbe and they had 2 sons and 1 daughter.



Seaman 2nd Class Myron Hess (1900-1972) Son of Daniel and Dora Hess, he trained in the U.S. Naval Radio School stationed on the Harvard campus in Cambridge to prepare a corps of Morse Code operators. He married Marion Eggleston and they had 3 sons and 1 daughter.



Pvt. Frederick Johnson (1888-1937) Son of Gustaf and Johanna Westerlund, he served at the Edgewood Arsenal in Maryland, a U.S. government plant that manufactured toxic gas used in the war. There were also facilities to fill artillery shells with the chemicals. He married Nellie White and they had 5 children.



Cpl. Harold E. Shaffer (1894-1918) Son of John & Libbie Shaffer, he was a member of Co. M, 107th Infantry that went overseas and fought on the Hidenburg Line. He was killed in action Sept. 29, 1918. He left a wife Violet and young baby girl Elizabeth. His body was brought home in 1921 and buried St. Johnsville.



Chief Carpenters Mate Everett Suters (1892-1942) Son of Thomas & Mary Ella Suters, he served in the navy on the Receiving ship at Philadelphia USS Newport News that carried coal and supplies to the European allies. He married Bessie Martin.



LITTLE FALLS

Pvt. Martin Canner (1895-1972) Son of George and Julia Canner, he served in C. B, 302 Battalion Tank Corps and then the 317 Co. Tank Corps. He served overseas. He married Maude Nichols and they had 2 daughters Julia and Margaret.



Pvt. 1st Class Leon Comstock (1898-1966) Son of Wesley and Grace, he served in the Hqs. 2nd Inf. Brig., 1st Division and was overseas; engagements, Mont. Dedier, Noyon def., Aisne-Marne off., St. Mihiel off., Meuse-Argonne off. He married Madeline Ryan.



Musician Marco Dandre (1894-1968) Born in Monteleone, Italy, he came to the U.S. as a young man. He served as a musician in the 153 Dep. Brig. and Hq. Co. 336 Field Artillery. He and his wife Dena had 1 son and 2 daughters.



Pvt. Angelo DiCarlo (1896-1918) Born in Sulmona Province in Italy, he came to this country to make the ultimate sacrifice. He served in the 151 Depot Brigade and Co. E, 305 Infantry and served overseas. He was killed in action on Oct. 3, 1918. His mother Mrs. Lucia DiCarlo, who still lived in Italy, was notified. The DeCarlo-Staffo Post was named in his memory.



Pvt. John Macali (1895-1982) Born in Carpineto, Italy, He served in Co. I, 59th Pioneer Infantry to his discharge. He and his wife Sofia had 3 daughters, Ida Riccardo, Elsie Arduini, and Lucy Rocco.



Sgt. Bernard McEvoy (1896-1970) Son of Edward & Katherine, he served in Co. A, 306 (or could be 606) Engineers until his discharge. He married Irene Smith and they had 1 son and 1 daughter.

His brother Joseph McEvoy also served.



Pvt. Joseph Leo McEvoy (1893-1958) served in the Chemical Warfare Service during the war, primarily at the Edgewood Arsenal in Maryland. He was a commander of the Little Falls American Legion Post.



Pvt. Ralph Renzulli (1896-ca.1950) Born in Fuodgi, Italy, he came to the U.S. in 1913. When he entered military service to fight for his new country, he was naturalized at Camp Dix in 1918. He married Helen Coppola and they had 5 children, Anthony, Alfred, Louise, Frank and Angelina.



Col. Edward Hall Teall (1885-1937) Son of Frederick and Sarah, he graduated from West Point Military Academy. He served in the 180th Inf. Brigade, 90th Division and was overseas, involved in the St. Mihiel drive and the Meuse-Argonne offensive. He was a part of the army of occupation headquartered at Coblenz, Germany. He married Estelle Snyder, dau. of Homer P. Snyder, and was president of H.P. Snyder Mfg. Co. They had 3 children.

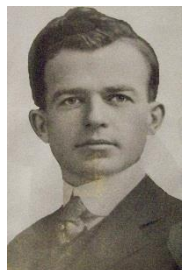
MOHAWK



Pvt. 1st Class Clarence Campeau (1891-1960) Son of Levi and Elizabeth Compo, he served in the 112th Engineers, Medical Dept. and served overseas and was in the battle of Argonne. He married Eulalia Duell and had 2 stepsons and 2 daughters Margaret & Mary Frances.



Pvt. James V. S. Casey (1898-1988) Son of Dr. Fred and Mary Eliza Casey, he enlisted and was at the Army Training Camp at Cornell University in Ithaca. He married Mary Smith and had 1 son James and 2 daughters Mary and Frances. He was Mayor of Mohawk and Supervisor of German Flatts.



Sgt. John Crowley (1886-1918) Son of Daniel and Hannah Crowley, he was a member of Co. M, 107th Infantry. He served overseas and was killed in action Sept. 29, 1918. Awarded Service Cross for extraordinary heroism. The Crowley-Barnum American Legion Post in Mohawk is named in his memory.



Pvt. James Arthur Hyde (1898-1975) Son of Lee and Kate Hyde, he was inducted Oct. 9, 1918 and was sent to Co. C Students Army Training Camp at Syracuse Univ. and to Camp Taylor in Kentucky, one of the largest military training camps for the war. He married Hilda Anderson and had 3 daughters and 1 son.



Pvt. Leslie Keno (1894-1965) Son of Albert and Delphine Keno, he served in Co. M, 107th Infantry. He served overseas with the regiment and was wounded in action on Sept. 29, 1918. He married Anna Stern and they had one son Ronald.



1st Lieut. Harry J. Kerr (1890-1918) Son of James and Margaret Kerr, he was a member of Co. M and served in the New York National Guard in charge of guarding the Ashokan Dam and was in great demand as a drillmaster. Married Myrtle Harter and they had 2 sons Arthur & Robert. He died of pneumonia.



1st Lieut. Earl K. Palmer (1887-1970) He was in Co. M NYS National Guards and transferred to 107th Infantry. Assigned to 152nd Dept. Brigade. He served overseas and was in the battles of Ypres-Lys and Flanders. He married Ethel Schaufler and had 3 sons and 1 dau.



Pvt. Llewellyn Wainwright (1899-1974) He was in Co. E. 57th Pioneer Inf. And then an ambulance driver for the Medical Dept. Evacuation Hospital overseas. He married Marion Buckley and they had 4 sons. He was a commander of the William Hempstead VFW Post in Ilion.



Capt. David Wightman (1892-1974) Son of Vincent & Janet, he served in the 1st Pioneer Infantry and 368th Infantry. Overseas engagements: Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne, Meuse-Argonne, Army of Occupation. He married Ruth Fulmer and had son Robert and daughter Lois. Mayor of Mohawk and Assemblyman.

NEWPORT



Sgt. 1st Class Stanley Autenrith (1894-1966) Son of William and Minnie, he was trained at the Aviation Camp in Waco, TX and served in the 32nd Balloon Company in air surveillance. He married Marion Scheufler and was first commander of Adirondack Post #1118 American Legion in Cold Brook.



Pvt. Guy H. Bateman (1898-1918) Son of Clifford and Kate Bateman, he joined local Co. M for service in Mexico and did guard duty on the New York City Aqueduct. When the US entered the war, he served in Co. M, 107th Infantry and went overseas. In the engagement of the Hindenburg Line, he was killed in action on Sept. 29, 1918.



Cpl. LaMonte Evans (1881-1921) Son of Robert and Clara Evans, he enlisted in the Army at Ft. Slcum in 1913. During the war, he served in the Coastal Artillery in Balboa at Fort Amador to protect the Pacific (southern) end of the Panama Canal. He married Emma Carter.

Pvt. Harry Farrell (b. 1895) Born in Middleville, but lived on the Farrell farm on White Creek Rd. in Newport. He served in Co. B, 51st Pioneer Inf. And served overseas; engagements, St. Mihiel off., Woevre front, Meuse and Moselle, Army of Occupation.



Cpl. Raymond Fisher (1890-1934) Son of Henry & Margaret Fisher, he served with the 103 Trench Mortar Battery and served overseas. He suffered shell shock and for 3 days was lost with his company in the Argonne Forest. He married Edyth Jones and had son Kenneth and dau. Charlotte.



Sgt. Linus C. Ford (1896-1981) Son of Benjamin and Avis Ford, he served in the Quartermaster Corps at Mt. Clemons, Michigan, a U.S. Air Service Training Camp at Selfridge Field. He married Marjorie Newman and they had children Elinor, Douglas & Mary. He was village of Newport historian.



Pvt. 1st Class Webster Harris (1891-1978) Son of Sherman and Eva Harris, he served at the Medical Base Hospital 48 in France to care for the sick and wounded soldiers. He married Kathryn Smith and wrote a memoir of his war experience for his daughters Jane, Evelyn and Eva.



Pvt. 1st Class Clelaon Helmer (1891-1970) Son of Adam and Mildred Helmer, he served in the 153 Depot Brigade and Co. H, 59 Pioneer Infantry and served overseas. He married Cecilia Lynch, they had Catherine, Francis, Mary and Raymond.



Pvt. 1st Class Raymond Ryan (1894-1978) Son of Patrick and Ellen Ryan, he served overseas in France at Base Hospital 48 where he ran the railroad engine taking supplies and patients around to the hospital units. He married Mabel Farrell and they had children Helen, Ann & John.



Pvt. 1st Class John Santamour (1894-1978) Born in St. Lawrence County, son of Sandy & Emaline Santimore, he enlisted at Gouverneur, NY. He was in the Army Military Police, serving in Co. I, 345th Infantry. He m. Nellie Corey and had 12 children.



Pvt. Dean Spellman (1900-1988) Son of Michael and Carrie Spellman, he was inducted on Oct. 3, 1918 and was in Co. A at the Students Army Training Camp at Union College, Schenectady. He married Genevieve Clifford and had 6 children.

TOWN OF NORWAY



Cpl. Raymond Farber (1892-1980) Son of Henry and Rosilda Farber, he served overseas with Co. B., 301st Supply Train stationed in France. He married Mildred Evans and they had 2 children Rosilda and Raymond. They owned and operated a dairy farm in Dolgeville for many years.

TOWN OF OHIO



Pvt. Charles B. Gray (1897-1979) Son of Charles and Melissa Gray, he served in the 6th Co., 20th Reg. Engineers of Forestry overseas. He married Verne Brondstatter and they had 2 daus. Jane Clark and Elaine Johnsen. His brother **Latham B. Gray** (1894-1979) was a Wagoner in Co. A, 10th Engineers.

TOWN OF RUSSIA



Pvt. Jerome Darrow (1896-1990) Son of John and Ruth Darrow, he was inducted Sept. 5, 1918 and was stationed at the Field Artillery Replacement Draft Camp in Jackson S.C. He married Ethel Newman and they had children Florence (Renodin) and Ernest. He was master of the Newport Masonic Lodge.



Private Morris Fenton Howe (1899-1958) Son of Frank and Minnie Howe, he served in the Coast Artillery Corps, 38th Artillery and then the 46th Regiment overseas. He married Viola Pryor and they had 3 daughters Anna, Neista & Patricia.
